
*We want to ensure your new sofa fits through the doors, so we've devised a little checklist to ensure it'll get wherever it's intended to go! Take a moment to print out this handy form and follow our pointers, and when your sofa arrives it'll slot in seamlessly.*

## 1 YOUR SOFA DIMENSIONS

You'll find all the information you need for this on our website. Simply search for your sofa and click on the 'Dimensions' tab underneath the product image. To ensure you have the measurements to hand while you move around the house, jot them down here;

- a) Sofa width .....
- b) Sofa depth .....
- c) Sofa height .....

*Psssssst\* Your sofa legs are detachable, so make sure you note down the height without feet.*




## 2 PLOTTING THE PINCH POINTS

A good rule of thumb is to track the journey your sofa will take, starting from where it exits the delivery van, all the way to the room it'll be living in. When you're doing this you need to plot any potential pinch points. A pinch point is wherever the area becomes narrower, so this could mean anything from a garden gate to a tricky stairwell or your own front door...

Using your front door as an example, measure the *internal* width (A) and height (B) at their narrowest points. Your sofa can be rotated to fit the gap so you just need to check whether;

- The depth of your sofa is smaller than the height of the gap
- The height of your sofa is smaller than the width of the gap




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# 3 AWKWARD HALLWAYS & OBSTRUCTIONS

With any small space that the sofa has to navigate through, it's important to open out doors in these areas as far as possible and then measure the smallest internal gap. Be mindful of radiators and shelves that cause obstructions. You'll also need to take any door handles, handrails or wall fixtures into account when taking the measurements.


- a) Narrowest doorway width .....

# 4 NARROW STAIRS & TIGHT TURNS

If there are awkward corners and stairwells throughout your sofa's journey there are a few additional measurements you will need to check.


- Firstly make note of the width (A) of your stairs at their narrowest point. Refer to the height of your sofa and ensure it is smaller than the measurement of your stairs.
- If you have a bannister that the sofa needs to be lifted over, please check that the height between the top of the bannister and the ceiling allows enough space for the depth of your sofa.
- If your sofa has to turn a tight corner or pivot in a small space, please ensure that the height from the floor to the ceiling in this area is bigger than the width of your sofa.



# 5 IS THERE A LIFT?

If our delivery team will need to use a lift to get to your property, you'll need to measure this too. Simply check the internal width (A), the depth (B) and the height (C) and ensure these measurements are greater than the width, depth and height of your sofa.

- a) Total lift width .....
- b) Total lift depth .....
- c) Total lift height .....
